




Why Ro Khanna Thinks Democrats Need A Total Makeover

he Democratic Party's crisis isn't just about policy · it's about courage. Or more precisely, it's about what happens when a political party forgets how to fight for anything beyond the preservation of its own respectability.

This became apparent during the recent government shutdown negotiations, when seven Senate Democrats and one independent caved to Republicans while telling themselves they were being responsible stewards of democracy. The episode crystallized a growing chasm between Democratic leadership and a base that's tired of watching its party get outmaneuvered by opponents who understand that politics is about power rather than

I spoke this week to Rep. Ro Khanna of California, a potential 2028 presidential candidate and one of the first Democrats to call for Senate Minority Leader Charles E. Schumer (D-New York) to step down shortly before the vote passed on Sunday. "We need a total makeover of the Democratic Party," Khanna told me, his frustration barely contained. "There is no establishment. The powers that be are weaker than they've ever been before.'

Khanna's critique points to a generational divide between Democrats who still believe in the fantasy of bipartisan governance and those who recognize that we're living through an authoritarian moment that demands actual opposition. I keep returning to something Khanna told me about Democratic leaders who see themselves as "guardians of institutions as opposed to responding to the populist moment we're in.

There's something almost tragic in that phrase. These are elected officials who came of age believing in a certain version of American governance, where reasoned deliberation eventually wins out, where being "the adults in the room" means something. They've spent decades mastering the choreography of legislative compromise, only to discover that the music has changed entirely.

Here are excerpts from our conversation, edited for clarity

Shadi Hamid: Briefly lay out the case for why Sen. Chuck Schumer should be replaced.

Rep. Ro Khanna: Sen. Schumer has lost touch with the grassroots base of our party. If you're not going to fight for health care, then what are you going to fight for? The reality is that Schumer deserves credit for being a master legislator during the Biden administration. He and I worked on the Chips Act together, which would never have passed if it weren't for him. But he has failed to meet the moment when it comes to this time in history.

He has been on the wrong side of foreign policy, a cheerleader for the war in Iraq, an advocate for a blank check of funding to [Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin] Netanyahu, a person who refused to endorse [New York Mayor-elect] Zohran Mamdani.

The argument on the opposite side is that Democrats had already made their point. They were able to successfully place the blame on Republicans. The American people responded in turn last week, as Democrats swept elections in key races. But federal workers were feeling the pain. Americans receiving benefits through the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program, or SNAP, were hurting, with millions facing food insecurity as a result. Why not stop the pain?

That's a political way of looking at it. For me, it's an issue of substantively improving people's lives. Someone just came up to me at an airport two days ago. And they said, "Look, my father is a taxi driver in Arizona. His premium is going to go up from \$44 a month to about \$2,600 a month, and he's got cancer. His deductible is going to go up from \$800 to \$6,000. What am I supposed to do?" We have abandoned those individuals. I believe we could have gotten some relief for them. We could have gotten a one-year extension, if not a permanent extension of Affordable Care Act credits. Republican Rep. Michael Lawler [of New York] already floated that. We could have opened up a conversation about eligibility even and had some compromise on that in terms of the income levels of people who would qualify. But by basically not getting any of that, we have subjected about 20 million Americans to extraordinary pain.

I think there's also some confusion about what actually happened. Schumer himself did not vote with Republicans. It was seven other Democrats and an independent who did. Perhaps they're the ones who deserve more of the blame here? Isn't there a risk of making Schumer into a scapegoat when the problem runs deeper in the Democratic caucus?

Well, this is the D.C. dance. Everyone knows that Schumer was consulted at every step of the way by these

eight senators. The senators have said that themselves, that they were keeping Schumer informed. Schumer's No. 2 person [Sen. Dick Durbin of Illinois] is voting for the bill. It's hard to imagine he would do that if Schumer was telling him no. And certainly Schumer never said publicly to members of his caucus don't vote for this. This is something that if Schumer wanted to stop, he could have.

The disappointment with Schumer and Democratic leadership had been building. This is just what pushed things over the edge. In a two-party system, and with President Donald Trump's authoritarian designs, you need the opposing party to actually oppose - and to be seen as fighting. Instead, Democrats have seemed feckless and aimless. The failure to rise to the occasion has been somewhat mystifying. Why do Democrats seem to have so much trouble growing a backbone?

It's a generational issue. You have people who have been in office for 10, 20, 30 years who believe in a certain way of doing things, of being the adults in the room. They think they're acting responsibly and keeping the institutions of government running. I've talked to enough of the Senate to know that they believe the House runs too hot, and that they're the cooler heads that kind of preserve order in our democracy

So they are viewing things as sort of guardians of institutions as opposed to responding to the populist moment we're in. And that populist moment is saying institutions have failed us. The younger generation gets that. And that's why, you're right, this was building with Schumer. We need a total makeover of the Democratic Party. And it's doable. There is no establishment. The powers that be are weaker than they've ever been before. It's a total open field running for the Congress, the Senate and the presidency.

Isn't there something to be said for preserving institutions and order, considering how much Trump has run roughshod over them? Isn't there an argument for taking the higher moral ground and saying let's not try to burn things down and let's keep the institutions running even if they're flawed?

The traditional Democratic argument is the preservation and restoration of institutions. The Trump argument is that those institutions didn't work, and we need to burn them all down because they led to the hollowing

out of factory towns and rural America. The Democratic answer needs to be that we need to have transformed institutions to work in the 21st century, that we certainly need to be building things up instead of tearing them down, but that the institutions of the past have failed the working and middle class, have failed rural communities, and that we need a new institutional framework rooted in our constitutional tradition to address the decline of the American Dream. I call that economic patriotism.

Speaking of transformation, you alluded to Schumer's refusal to endorse Zohran Mamdani. And the same goes for [House Minority Leader] Hakeem Jeffries, who only offered a tepid endorsement at the last moment. Was that a sign that something had definitively gone wrong with Democratic leadership to not support a candidate who won by a clear margin in the



were the two times that Schumer failed to stand up during shutdown negotiations. But then his knocking [progressive Senate candidate] Graham Platner in Maine.
Putting his thumb on the scale on these races has sent a terrible message to young voters and progressives.

His inability to recognize the phenomenal campaign of Mamdani speaks of a tone-deafness. And the reality is, I thought Barack Obama had ended the career of anyone who voted for the war in Iraq. But then, when these people like Schumer - who cheerleaded us into the biggest disaster in American foreign policy's modern history - also showed a total moral obliviousness to Gaza, that also contributes to his need to step aside. Look, Donald Trump obliterated the pro-Iraq War constituency from his party. I don't understand why we can't sideline the pro-Iraq War constituency from our party.

What would you say to critics who say that progressives like yourself are using this call for Schumer to step down as a way to create tensions within the Democratic Party in an effort to remake it in a more progressive image? How much of this is a kind of power play for progressives?

If the question is "Will the fight with Schumer help us in the effort to reshape the Democratic Party?" - I plead

Gaza is a major divide within the party, where you have a leadership that is pro-Israel and deferential to Netanyahu and a base that is increasingly pro-Palestinian. The party risks hemorrhaging young progressive voters if it can't speak truthfully about what happened in Gaza. But how do you resolve that internal tension? Because what that means is that Democrats may not be able to offer a unified front on one of the biggest moral questions of our time.

I believe this will be a fault line in the 2028 election, and the nominee will determine the direction of the party. If you did not vote against the \$14 billion in aid to Netanyahu, then you are basically in a similar position to those Democrats who voted for the war in Iraq. If you're unwilling to recognize the United Nations finding that there was a genocide in Gaza, then you are out of touch with where Democratic voters are.

Saikat Chakrabarti Among Several Democrats Hoping To Fill Seat **Just Vacated By Nancy Pelosi**

savvy political operative and fervent supporter of Bernie Sanders, also credited with the success of candidates like Alexandria Ocasio Cortez, has the political landscape somewhat cleared with former Speaker Nancy Pelosi's announcement she would not seek re-election. He now faces off against several other aspiring Democrats who want to fill the San Francisco vacancy.

The Indian American candidate, Saikat Chakrabarti, who was born in Texas, and moved to San Francisco in 2009, hopes to get the Democratic Party endorsement in perhaps the most high-profile race in the country, aspiring to represent California's 11th Congressional District in the November 3, 2026 election. The primary date is yet to be announced.

Many Democratic contenders have the same ambition as Chakrabarti. Ballotpedia shows at least 5 Democrats are battling for the primary win, as Pelosi declared she was not running for reelection. So far, Chakrabarti has received the endorsement of Track AIPAC, which tracks the powerful American Israel Political Action Committee. Track AIPAC has endorsed other Indian Americans like Chris Ahuja, candidate for the US House of Representatives from California's 32nd District, and Kshama Sawant, candidate for the US House from Washington's 9th District, as well as Junaid Ahmed of Pakistani heritage running from Illinois' 8th District, and scientist Karishma Manzur running for the US Senate from New Hampshire.

Chakrabarti promises to "change the Democratic Party" if elected, so that it fights "for Medicare for All, building millions of units of affordable housing, ending big money in politics, taxing the billionaires and corporations, and other overwhelmingly popular policies.

On his Facebook page, Saikat For Congress, Chakrabarti describes himself as, "Engineer, organizer, policy wonk. Democrat running for Congress to represent San Francisco (CA-11). We need solutions as big as the problems we face.'

"Very Much Looking Forward": Sergio Gor To Becoming New US Ambassador To India

ergio Gor, the newly appointed US Ambassador to India, on Wednesday expressed optimism as he takes charge and thanked US President Donald Trump for the opportunity. In a post on X, he said, "Very much looking

In a post on X, he said, "Very much looking forward to being the new U.S. Ambassador to India. Thank you @POTUS @realDonaldTrump! I'm deeply grateful for this opportunity and committed to honoring the faith you've shown in me."

During the swearing-in ceremony of Gor on Tuesday (local time), Trump said he was entrusting Gor to further strengthen strategic, economic, and security ties with New Delhi, while deepening America's "fantastic relationship" with Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

"I'm trusting Sergio to help strengthen our country's one of the most important international relationships, and that is the strategic partnership with the Republic of India. It's a big deal. India is a home to one of the world's oldest civilisations, the largest country in the world and it has got over 1.5 billion people and we have a fantastic relationship with Prime Minister Modi and Sergio's enhanced that because he's become already friendly with Prime Minister. Knowing that Sergio is going to be the Ambassador, they would call constantly to say, 'let's get to know this man' and they like what they see."

"I know you're gonna have a great success over there. It's a very important relationship. It's also the fastest-growing middle class and it's an important economic and strategic security partner in the Indo-Pacific region. It's an amazing country".

"As the Ambassador, Sergio will work to fortify our

country's bond, promote investments in key US industries and technologies, increase American energy exports, and expand our security cooperation", he further added.

After taking the oath, Gor thanked Trump for entrusting him with the responsibility of the relationship with India and said, "I look forward to enhancing the relationship between our two nations. I look forward to doing a great job for you".

In August, Trump nominated Sergio Gor as India's next ambassador and Special Envoy for South and Central Asian Affairs

During his testimony before the Senate Foreign Relations Committee in September, Gor had emphasised that India is "one of the most important relationships our nation (US) has in the world."

Ahead of his swearing-in, he had visited India in October and met Prime Minister Narendra Modi, EAM S Jaishankar and NSA Ajit Doval.

During the swearing-in ceremony Trump remarked, "We have a fantastic relationship with the Prime Minister, (Narendra) Modi, and Sergio (Gor) has only enhanced that because he's become already friendly with the Prime Minister."

Underscoring India's rapid economic growth and its key role in regional security, Trump stated, "India has the fastest-growing middle class and is an 'important' economic and strategic security partner in the Indo-Pacific region."

He continued, "It's an amazing country, actually, 1.5 billion people. China has 1.4 billion.

Those are two big countries. As Ambassador, Sergio will work to fortify our country's bond, promote investments in key US industries and technologies, increase American energy exports and expand our security cooperation."

Expressing confidence in Gor's appointment, the US President added, "Knowing that Sergio is going to be the Ambassador, they would call constantly to say, 'let's get to know this man', and they like what they see."

Trump Softens Stance On H-1B Visa Reform, Says US Needs To "Bring This Talent" As It Can't Rely On Long-Term Unemployed

S President Donald Trump has appeared to have softened his stance on his administration's aggressive push on H-1B visa reforms, acknowledging the need to import specialised foreign talent to fill critical roles in the American workforce.

During an interview with Fox News host Laura Ingraham on Tuesday (local time), Trump defended the value of skilled immigrant workers, arguing that the US cannot simply repurpose long-term unemployed Americans for complex roles in manufacturing and defence without extensive training. The US President further noted that while he supports raising wages for American

workers, the US must still "bring this talent" to maintain its industrial and technological edge.

"I agree, but you also have to bring this talent," Trump said when asked whether H1B visa reform would be a major priority for his administration.

Earlier in September, Trump signed a proclamation that triggered a major overhaul of the H-1B visa petition.

According to the proclamation, there will now be a USD 100,000 fee for new H-1B visa applications, a sharp increase from the previous level of about USD 1,500.

The US State Department later clarified that the new fee requirement applies only to individuals or companies filing new H-1B petitions or entering the H-1B lottery after September 21. Current visa holders and petitions submitted before that date remain unaffected.

Under the proclamation, a USD 100,000 payment must



accompany every new H-1B visa petition filed after the deadline, including those submitted for entries in the 2026 lottery.

When countered during the interview that the US has "plenty of talented people," Trump countered, "No, you don't. There are certain skills you don't have, and people have to learn them. You can't take people off the unemployment line and say, 'I'm going to put you into a factory where we're going to make missiles.'"

The US President further cited an example from the state of Georgia, where, according to him, the removal of skilled foreign workers created difficulties in manufactur-

ing complex products.

"They had people from South Korea that had made batteries all their life. Making batteries is very complicated and very dangerous — a lot of explosions, a lot of problems. They had like 500 or 600 people in the early stages to make batteries and to teach people how to do it," he said.

Trump was referring to the raids conducted by the US Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) officials at an under-construction Hyundai plant in the state of

Georgia in September, during which hundreds of South Korean workers were arrested and deported.


He emphasised that such industries require specialised expertise that cannot be immediately filled by untrained or long-term unemployed workers.

"You can't just say a country is coming in, going to invest USD 10 billion to build a plant, and take people off the unemployment line who haven't worked in five years and they're going to start making missiles. It doesn't work that way," he added.

Trump's remarks mark a notable shift from his earlier hardline stance on foreign worker visas, particularly the H-1B programme, which has been one of the central topics in US debates over immigration and employment.

Rubio Praises India's Handling Of Latest Terror Attack

nited States Secretary of State Marco Rubio, praised India's handling of the latest terrorist attack in India. He made the remarks during a press conference at Hamilton International Airport in Canada where he was attending the G7 foreign ministers' meetings, also attended among others, by India's Minister of External Affairs S. Jaishankar.

The car-bomb blast occurred near India's iconic Red Fort November 10, 2025, killed 13 people and injured several others. India is investigating the explosion under India's Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Adt, a law used mainly to deal with terrorism-related activities.

Secretary Rubio was asked how concerned he was with latest car explosion incident in light of conflict between India and Pakistan earlier this year.

Rubio responded, "we're aware of the potential that that holds. But I think the Indians are – need to be commended; they have been very measured and cautious and very professional in how they're carrying out this investigation. That investigation continues. Clearly, it was a terrorist attack. It was a car loaded with highly explosive materials that detonated

and killed a lot of people. But I think they're doing a very good job of carrying out an investigation; and I think when they have facts, they'll release those facts." Conceding that the US administration

Conceding that the US administration was aware of the potential the latest incident has and he did speak about it "a little bit today" with his Indian counterpart.

"But I think we're going to wait and see what their investigation reveals. We've offered to help, but I think they're very capable in these investigations. They don't need our help. They're doing a good job, and I thought they were very measured and professional in how they've approached it, as they usually are," Rubio

added

At a State Department press briefing in Washington on the same day, November 12, spokesperson Tammy Bruce was asked about Pakistan's growing favorable relations with the Trump administration.

"I would say that our relationship with both nations is as it has been, which is good, and that is the benefit of having a president who knows everyone, talks to everyone, and that is how we can bring differences together in this case. So, it's clear that the diplomats here are committed to both nations," Bruce said.

"I can tell you also that there has been a U.S.-Pakistan Counterterrorism Dialogue that was established. At this dialogue in Islamabad, the United States and Pakistan reaffirmed their shared commitment to combatting terrorism in all its forms and manifestations during this latest round of the talks in Islamabad," Bruce added.

"The United States and Pakistan discussed ways to enhance cooperation to counter terrorist threats. And I think that for the region and for the world, the United States working with both those nations is good news and will promote a future that's beneficial," Bruce concluded.r before settling on Minnesota Gov. Tim Walz.

New York Times: Pakistan Hired Lobbying Firms With Close Ties To Trump

he New York Times reported November 13, 2025, that Pakistan hired lobbying firms with close ties to President Donald Trump; A few weeks later it not only got highly favorable tariff rates, but also "unique access" in Washington.

The article entitled, "How Pakistan's Spending Blitz Helped Win Over Trump and Flip U.S. Policy," notes that while other factors played an important role in a visible reversal of Pakistan policy, the hiring of six lobbying firms by Islamabad for close to \$5 million in April and May, was also an important factor. It notes that the amount Pakistan spent during the Spring, was "at least three times" as much as what India spent, sourcing the information to the Department of Justice.

The lobbyists Islamabad hired, included President Trump's "former business partners and bodyguard." The firms named in the NY Times article include Seiden Law LLP, Javelin, as well as a former bodyguard who served during the first Trump administration.

However, other factors had already played a major role in the reversal of policies toward Pakistan, among them, Pakistan crediting President Trump with ending the conflict with India, and nominating him for the Nobel Prize. Added to that was Islamabad pitching a \$500 million mineral extraction agreement with Washington, and opening up its markets to American farm goods.

Five Indian-Origin Students Among 32 Winners Of Prestigious 2025 US Rhodes Scholarship

ive Indian-Origin students
among 32 winners of prestigious

On November 16, 2025, the
Rhodes Trust announced its
selection of 104 Rhodes Scholars from
around the world, 32 of them from the
United States.

Among the 32 US Rhodes Scholars are at least five of Indian origin. That makes 15.63 percent of the US Scholars, way above the proportion of the Indian and Indian American population in this country.

tion in this country.

This year's Rhodes Scholars representing the US go to Oxford University in England to pursue graduate studies.

To get an idea of how competitive the selection process, these students had to undergo a tough vetting over and over again, to be finally elected by 16 independent committees around the country.

The 5 students of Indian origin were among 3,000 applicants; 865 were ultimately endorsed by 243 different colleges and universities. Committees of Selection in each of the 16 U.S. districts then invited 238 finalists to appear before them for interviews. All districts interviewed 14 or more finalists.

Rhodes Scholarships provide all expenses for two or three years of study at the University of Oxford (ranked the #1 university in the world in some global rankings) and may allow funding in some instances for four years.

From New York-North Aneesh Muppidi of Schenectady, NY, from Harvard University

Aneesh C. Muppidi, Schenectady, is a senior at Harvard University where he majors in Computer Science and Neuroscience. He has conducted research at Harvard's Computational Robotics Lab, Computational Cognitive Neuroscience Lab, and MIT's Fiete Lab. Aneesh's scholarship also informs his work on AI policy at the OSTP at the White House. Aneesh served as the President of the Harvard Computational Neuroscience Undergraduate Society, CoPresident of the Hindu Students Association, and President of the Harvard Spikeball Club. At Oxford, he will pursue an M.Sc. in Advanced Computer Science and a Master's in Public Policy.

From Florida, Angelin T. Mathew of Davie, from Yale University

US CONSULATES NOW ROUTING B-1 IN LIEU OF H-1B VISAS FOR EXTRA REVIEW IN WASHINGTON, D.C. By David H. Nachman, Esq

The U.S. Department of State (DOS) recently introduced a new review step for applicants under the B-1 in lieu of H-1B category. U.S. embassies and consulates must now send these applications to the Department of State's Visa Office in Washington, D.C. for secondary examination before a visa is issued. This added oversight reflects the government's increasing caution toward how this specialized category is being used.

Overview of the B-1 in Lieu of H-1B Category

This visa classification allows foreign professionals to engage in short, specialized work visits to the United States while staying on the payroll of their foreign employer. To qualify, the individual must continue to receive salary abroad and perform duties that are incidental to their foreign employment, not constituting local U.S. labor

After the \$100,000 "Visa Integrity Fee" for new H-1B petitions took effect on September 21, 2025, authorities began to monitor this category more closely. Some employers may be tempted to use it as a way to avoid the new fee or to bypass the standard H-1B petition process.

Centralized Review and Its Impact

With the DOS Visa Office now reviewing these applications, longer processing times FAQ - B-1 IN LIEU OF H-1B VISA REVIEW and more detailed evaluations are expected. Employers should take proactive 1. Why are U.S. consulates forwarding these visa cases to Washington, D.C.? measures to avoid issues, including:

- Demonstrating a valid foreign employer-employee relationship through the implementation of the new H-1B Visa Integrity Fee. documentation.
- Confirming that wages are paid outside the United States.
- Ensuring the U.S. assignment is temporary and narrowly defined.
- · Preparing for extended adjudication timelines under the centralized system.

Although this visa path remains technically available, it should be considered only when the business purpose clearly fits within permissible parameters.

Cricket-India Confront Batting Blind Spot After Kolkata Pitch Boomerangs

India have long curated home tracks that accentuate turn, but the assumption their own batters would master such conditions no longer appears safe following their defeat in the opening test against South Africa.

On a treacherous Eden Gardens' pitch, the ball bounced irregularly and turned sharply and none of the teams posted 200. Touring captain Temba Bavuma's unbeaten 55 was the highest score by any batter.

India, a batter short as skipper Shubman Gill retired hurt in the first innings with a neck injury and did not bat in the second, were bundled out for 93 chasing 124 for victory.

South African spinners claimed 12 of the 18 Indian wickets in the match exposing the home batters' vulnerabilities

against the turning ball.

South Africa off-spinner Simon Harmer finished with a match haul of eight wickets to bag the player-of-the-match award.

It was jarring to home fans used to watching nimble-footed and supplewristed Indian batters dominate spin.

India head coach Gautam Gambhir mounted a spirited defence of the much-maligned pitch on Sunday, shifting the conversation from conditions to competence.

"The point is that you should be able to know how to play turn," Gambhir said in an assessment of their batting that led to the sobering defeat inside three days.

"I felt that if you are willing to put your head down and if you have a solid defence, if you have the temperament, you can definitely score runs.

"Yes, it might not be a wicket which is going to (allow you to) be very, very

flamboyant, where you can play those big shots. But if you are willing to put your head down, definitely it's a wicket where you can score."

Opener KL Rahul's 39 in the first innings was the highest score by an Indian batter in the match.

India have slipped to the fourth place in the World Test Championship standings after the loss and have plenty to ponder ahead of the second and final test in Guwahati

Gill was taken to hospital and later discharged, but is doubtful for the test in Guwahati beginning on November 22.

India played spin-bowling all-rounder Washington Sundar at number three in Kolkata but B Sai Sudharsan is likely to reclaim his top-order place in Guwahati especially if Gill is not available.

Between funding freezes and budget cuts, it's By Natalie B. Compton, Hannah Sampson been a tough year for national parks. But "now is a great time" to return, said Jim Pattiz, cofounder of More Than Just Parks, which promotes and raises awareness about public

Fall days with cooler temperatures offer a respite from summer heat and peak crowds. The national park system saw sporadic restrictions during the government shutdown, and outdoor parks remained largely open, but there were no workers to staff some historic sites and visitor centers, or direct some tours.

"Now, as operations resume, parks across the country are welcoming visitors back in full," the National Park Service said in a statement Thursday.

"NPS employees and partners are working quickly to restore normal services and ensure visitors can continue to enjoy these treasured places." Pattiz said travelers should remember that employees may have their hands full when they return to work, and that it may take time for cleanup or full access to be restored.

"I would just encourage people to give our park employees words of encouragement when you go see them," Pattiz said. "Thank them for what they're doing."

Here are seven parks that are perfect for a late fall visit.

Guadalupe Mountains National Park

Guadalupe Mountains National Park, one of the lesser visited in the country, promises a variety of West Texas wilderness: mountains, canyons, desert and dunes. The 86,416-acre expanse contains more than 80 miles of hiking trails.

Intrepid travelers with eight hours to spare can take on the 8.4-mile hike to Guadalupe Peak, the highest point in Texas.

In the fall, visitors can expect sun and mild weather; average temperatures in November range from highs around 60 to lows in the 30s (although these estimates drop 5-10 degrees at higher elevation in the park).

Plan your road trip wisely: You'll want to arrive with a full tank, as there are no gas stations available inside the park.

Great Smoky Mountains

The Smokies in North Carolina and Tennessee are a fan favorite - more than 12 million visitors came in 2024, the most of any national park. October is the busiest month as leaf peepers flock to fall colors. That's why Pattiz likes to visit in November, when visitors can still find colorful leaves at lower elevations but avoid traffic jams.

"It's my favorite time to go because the crowds have died off from their crazy peak times and you don't have to deal with trying to find a parking spot and all these things that you do in the middle of October," he said.

He warns that campers should be prepared for "surprisingly low" temperatures at night: At low elevation, the average low is 33 and high is 61. Higher elevations are likely to be colder.

Pattiz said one of the park's "big draws" is the elk, which can be viewed in parts of the North Carolina side, including Cataloochee, Balsam Mountain and Oconaluftee. He also loves to visit Mingus Mill, a historic grist mill. "It's quiet and it feels very sort of Old World; you're taken out of the hustle and bustle of the rest of the park," he said. The interior is closed for preservation temporarily rehabilitation.

SEVEN NATIONAL **PARKS WE LOVE FOR**



Saguaro National Park

Saguaro National Park, home to the world's most iconic cactus, is one of the most easily accessible parks in the country, located just outside Tucson on both sides, actually.

The park is split into two districts with the city in between.

Tucson Mountain District to the west and Rincon Mountain District to the east offer similar landscapes and wildlife, but for more cactus action, head west.

You can bike, drive, hike or horseback around the park's scenic loops to best appreciate the otherworldly plants.

Fall visitors can expect average temperatures of 65 degrees during the day and 40 degrees at night.

The government shutdown limited access to the Rincon Mountain Visitor Center, Rincon Mountain District Entrance Road and Cactus Forest Loop Drive, but all other areas of the park are open.

Visit the Saguaro park current conditions website for updates.

Grand Canyon National Park

The Grand Canyon's North Rim closed for the season Friday, but the South Rim teems with hiking trails, scenic roads, incredible views and plenty to

The park remained open during the government shutdown, but some services such as the South Rim visitors center have been closed; the timeline for a return to normal was not available Thursday.

"It's usually a quieter time to come visit with great weather," said Mindy Riesenberg, communications officer for the nonprofit Grand Canyon Conservancy.

"It's not hot. It's beautiful, it's great for walking and hiking.

I find it to be one of the best times of the year to visit."

Average temperatures at the South Rim reach a high of about 52 degrees in November and dip to 27, but things warm up in the inner canyon to an average high of 68 and low of 46.

Everglades National Park

November kicks off the drier - and high - season at this 1.5-million-acre national park in South Florida, a great alternative to the wetter, more humid months. Scanning the river of grass for alligators or wading birds is so much more pleasant when you're not slapping mosquitos away. Expect average lows around 63 and highs of 83. "Visiting the Everglades this time of year is beautiful; it is the least buggy time of year, many migratory birds are coming in, and there are many plants blooming," like pastelflowered muhly grass, the nonprofit Everglades Institute said in a statement.

The organization offers van tours, paddling tours and "wet walks" to explore the park.

Death Valley National Park

In the summer, Death Valley records some of the hottest temperatures on the planet.

In the fall, visitors will find a climate that's much more humane. November average temperatures range from highs in the 70s to lows in the 40s.

Spend your day hiking through canyons and badlands, then stick around after dark.

The park is ranked the highest (gold tier) level by the International DarkSky Association, and according to its website, "Celestial objects which can be viewed from Death Valley are not visible elsewhere in the world."

Shenandoah National Park

Fall is high season for Shenandoah National Park, but you'll find fewer crowds after the leaves reach their peak and temperatures dip (in November and December, average highs top out around 39

That means a quieter time on the park's 500-plus miles of trail, particularly if you go midweek.

Hikers take note: The weather can change quickly, from a clear day at lower elevations to snow on the trails.

Check the park's conditions website before your visit, particularly if you're looking to take a scenic trip along Skyline Drive, which can be closed due to icy conditions.

Deconstructing India's Dramatic 2025 World Cup Victory Through The Gender Lens

ollowing the extensive coverage of the above (India's 2025 World Cup victory) in both Indian and international media, it would not be out of place to now examine its impact through the gender lens by addressing the following: To what extent does it reflect gender- parity for Indian women in team sports such as cricket by narrowing if not closing the gender gap. And secondly to what extent has it helped in reducing the social bias and stigma attached to women playing cricket.

As regards the first question, there are two differing viewpoints; there are those who point out that the cash reward of INR 51 crore announced by BCCI and the prize money of INR 40 crore by the ICC—totaling 90 crores to the women's team-while narrowing the gap still falls short of gender- parity; as in comparison, the men's team, which won the ICC T20 World Cup in 2024, received a much higher total of Rs 145.4 crore — Rs 20.4 crore from the ICC and Rs 125 crore bonus from the BCCI, which is about Rs 54 crore more than what the women's team got this year. Since in the final analysis it is the quantum of financial resources available that determines the quality of training facilities and more significantly the financial independence it is able to bestow on the players, many of them coming from under privileged families.

Traditionally, for many years, both men and women cricketers had to be in the employ of Indian government undertakings such as the railways, to sustain their cricket careers. For example, both former and current captains—Mithali Raj and Harmanpreet Kaur, worked for the Railways. Kaur had moved to Mumbai in 2014,

but to sustain herself, she had to work as a clerk in the Railways. In an online interview, she talked about how fatigued she was, travelling in the crowded suburban local trains in Mumbai to reach her place of work from home, leaving her exhausted by the time she reached her training facility. Deepti Sharma, another team-member is a DSP -deputy superintendent of police. Hopefully, the aforesaid cash awards and prize money– even after it is distributed equally to all team members– would place in their hands sufficient cash reserves to sustain a fulltime cricket career, without having to be in the employment of others.

Regarding the lack of gender parity, in the prize and cash awards, a differing viewpoint is held by Mithali Raj –who captained the team from 2004 to 2022—and

who in a recent online interview said: "We should stop comparing Men and Women's prize money and look into the positives and good work done by the BCCI in organizing the 2025 World Cup; also, the evolution of men and women's cricket is very different so you can't compare money....

look at the standard of men's cricket look at the number of events and tournaments they've won so far and they've been doing that for a long time... we've cracked it now so maybe in the next 10 years you probably will see the growth fast forward..."

As regards the second question relating to the social stigma attached to

women playing cricket, this was brought out very graphically by the anchor person interviewing Mithali, who said: You referred to how when you would play, there would be people who would say "her skin will turn dark why are you torturing her?" Mithali responded:" when it comes to social media and trolls... over a period of time you find a way.... build a thick skin and don't allow it to bother you.."

Quite often the supportive role of parents too goes a long way in defying conventional social norms. Aman Jot's father - a carpenter-was taunted for encouraging his daughter to play cricket, but he stood by his daughter. In a ToI interview of 2017, parents of Kaur stated that "they aren't conventional like other Punjab families in restricting the cricketer's social life. They added that they have never asked their daughter to suggest a suitable time and age to marry.... Cricket first...Right from childhood, we wanted her to be a batsman. We can't deny her right to build her career and ability to win laurels for India as a female star...

The one big transformative societal impact the recent victory has had is to have established once and for all that women's cricket in India, has come of age. It is no longer just a man's sport, the space of which women have been trying to share over the years. It is also interesting to note

that women's sports in India are attracting more and more male viewership, as reportedly 58% of the 2025 world cup event was viewed by men.

"They're Leaving Too Much To Chance...": Haddin On India Losing To South Africa On 'Spin-Friendly' Kolkata Pitch

ormer Australian cricketer Brad Haddin hascriticized the Indian team, which lost their first Test at Eden Gardens in 13 years
following a loss to South Africa by 31 runs.

following a loss to South Africa by 31 runs, saying that they are "leaving too much on chance" by using excessively spin-friendly surfaces and not allowing themselves to play their best cricket.

India's Test woes at home continued as they failed yet another test against quality spin. Simon Harmer haunted India with his sharp turn and bamboozling ways, securing eight wickets in the match and leaving India 31-run short of a modest target of 124 runs. This marked India's fourth successive loss to SENA nations at home in

Tests, after a humiliating 0-3 whitewash to New Zealand last year, which marked their first series loss at home in 12 years.

Speaking on the Willow Talk Podcast, Haddin said, "I just think they are leaving too much to chance. India play

their best cricket when they put a big total on the board, and then they make the opposition claustrophobic with their fields. Their spinners are better than anyone else on those surfaces, but their batters are not that good players of spin on surfaces like that."

He pointed out that under Virat Kohli's captaincy, Team India used to put up "big scoreboard pressure" with big totals and made their

scoreboard pressure" with big totals and made their opponents feel "claustrophobic" with aggressive field settings.

"When Virat Kohli took over as captain back then, they batted long and put big scoreboard pressure and left opponents claustrophobic with their fields. They areleaving too much to chance. It brings ordinary spinners into the game. They have taken their world-class batters out of the game. Your skill and the craft of um using your drift, using the different angles of the crease go out of it," he added.

Following the match in the presser, head coach Gau-

tam Gambhir had defended the pitch, saying that there were "no demons on it".

"There was no demon in this wicket. It was not an unplayable one. This was not a typical turning track. The majority of the wickets were claimed by the seamers. It was more of a test of your technique and mental toughness... Those who defended well scored runs. This is exactly what we wanted, but when you do not play well, this is what happens," he had said.

Haddin said he heard that Gambhir came out and said that they are happy with the surface they are playing on. "This cost them against New Zealand as well," he said.

India are 1-0 down in the series and will put their best foot forward in the second Test in Guwahati from November 22."


